

RHU's Hip-Hop and Street Dance Teacher Certification program is committed to upholding the highest standards of professionalism, ethics, and compliance. In the event that a candidate's behavior or actions violate program policies or NCCA rules and regulations, RHU may take adverse certification decisions. These decisions may include, but are not limited to, disciplinary actions, denial of eligibility, or recertification. The following policy and procedures outline the process for making adverse certification decisions.

Disciplinary Actions:

RHU's Hip-Hop and Street Dance Teacher Certification program may take disciplinary actions against candidates who engage in behavior that violates program policies or NCCA rules and regulations. Disciplinary actions may include, but are not limited to, the following:

- Verbal or written warning
- Suspension or termination from the program
- Revocation of certification
- Legal action if appropriate

Denial of Eligibility:

RHU's Hip-Hop and Street Dance Teacher Certification program may deny eligibility to candidates who do not meet the program's eligibility requirements or who engage in behavior that violates program policies or NCCA rules and regulations. Denial of eligibility may include, but is not limited to, the following:

- Failure to meet program eligibility requirements
- Failure to meet NCCA eligibility requirements
- Engaging in behavior that violates program policies or NCCA rules and regulations
- Providing false or misleading information on program applications or certification materials

Recertification:

RHU's Hip-Hop and Street Dance Teacher Certification program may deny recertification to candidates who do not meet the program's continuing education requirements or who engage in behavior that violates program policies or NCCA rules and regulations. Denial of recertification may include, but is not limited to, the following:

- Failure to meet program continuing education requirements
- Engaging in behavior that violates program policies or NCCA rules and regulations
- Providing false or misleading information on recertification applications or certification materials
